To whom it may concern:

As requested, as homeowners we would like to voice our concerns with the possible development of Makita Village.

We bought our home in 2007, and moved into on July 21, 2008. At no time was this development mentioned or a notice sent to homeowners. We would not have bought in this development if we knew that this was planned.

1. Water: where will it come from? We have had shortages and are requested from time to time to cut back on use. This question really needs to be answered.
2. Congestion: the light at Launiupoko Park and Kai Hele Ku takes four minutes to change between the hours of 6AM-7PM, (or 8PM) and the light at Hokiokio and Puamana Park changes after 90 seconds, that causes a backup both ways on the highway. Working at a store in the Gateway Shopping Center it has taken me more than a half-an-hour to get home between the hours of 3-5PM, which is a total of 4.6 miles, door to door, especially during tourist season.
3. The environmental impact with the construction of the bypass as seen now after it rains, the ocean is brown, which can't be good for the reef, fish or humans. Adding a new sewage treatment plant is a plan for disaster, as the Ka'anapali plant has proven.
4. We have had Nenes nest behind our house, so this project will effect that species. On a couple of occasions we have seen Pueo Owls, please do not take these animals away from the area.

We could go on with more statements but believe the Commission is wise enough to know the feelings of the residents who will be effected. We are hoping that this development along with the developments in Ma'alaea, Olowalu, the Puamana Homeless initiative are not already paid for and set in stone. We would like the Commission to actually listen to the people and truly consider the total impact that will

result in the years to come. We are becoming a mini-Honolulu on Maui, not a good thing.
