Background

As part of its Stage 2 Request for Proposals (RFP), Waiawa Phase 2 Solar, LLC was selected by Hawaiian Electric Company (HECO) to develop a solar and battery storage project in central Oahu at Waiawa, near the Ka Uka Boulevard exit of the H-2 freeway, known as Waiawa Phase 2 Solar Plus Storage.

A community outreach report was prepared on October 15, 2021 that covered outreach activities conducted up to the date of that initial report. This supplemental community outreach report is a follow up to that document and summarizes strategic outreach activities that have been conducted since September.

Outreach Activities

In the months since September 2021, the AES project team focused its efforts on outreach with the area Neighborhood Boards while also maintaining its communication with area leaders and labor organizations.

A powerpoint presentation was prepared to support neighborhood board outreach efforts (Attachment A).

Mililani Mauka/Launani Valley Neighborhood Board No.35

On September 21, 2021, Shane Peters and Kirstin Punu, AES Community engagement manager, made a project presentation to the board.

Most questions/comments were supportive with a few more technical or detailed in nature that are included below.

Questions/Comments:

• A board member pointed out that the price per kilowatt might be protected and confidential under the contract. As such, it might be best for the resolution to avoid references to price.

Response:

The AES team noted that the price was public information included in the terms of the project Power Purchase Agreement and approved by the Hawaii State Public Utilities Commission. As such, the information is not confidential and can therefore be included in the resolution without concern.

- A board member noted the importance of the state's renewable energy goals
- A board member noted there seemed to be a few solar projects in the area.

The board passed a resolution (Attachment B) in support of the project by unanimous consent, 7-0. Minutes from the September meeting are available <u>http://www4.honolulu.gov/docushare/dsweb/Get/</u> Document-295023/35_2021_9Min.pdf (Attachment C).

Pearl City Neighborhood Board No. 21

On September 28, 2021, Shane Peters and Kirstin Punu presented project details and answered questions from board members.

The board was supportive of the project. Positive comments were made with a few questions/comments worth noting below.

Questions/Comments:

• A board member asked why the project is only for 20 years. Shouldn't it be longer?

Response:

The AES team noted that the 20-year term was a requirement of the landowner, Kamehameha Schools but that the project agreements may be renewed if all parties are open.

• A board member asked if the project might be contributing to drone complaints in the area.

Response: The AES team noted that drones have not been used for the project, however, a helicopter was utilized to survey the property in late 2020.

• A board member asked about removing or replacing trees.

Response:

The AES team noted that the project was in the early stages and a specific plan had not yet been formulated. The team committed to following up with the board once information was available.

• A community member asked whether the project conforms to the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (UN SDG).

Response: The AES team noted that the project meets a number of the UN SDG goals.

Waipahu Neighborhood Board No. 22

On October 28, 2021, Shane Peters and Kirstin Punu made a presentation to the board and answered questions.

The board was generally supportive with a few technical questions and comments. The board chair noted that they did not have quorum and that any action on this project would need to occur at their next meeting in November.

Questions/Comments:

• A board member noted the size of the project approximately equals to two (2) golf courses and powers 18,000 homes but the project will be decommissioned in 20 years. How does this makes sense. ?

Response:

The AES team noted that technology changes very quickly. PPAs are structured for a limited time to provide flexibility for new projects that might provide more efficient technology.

• A board member asked whether this was Castle and Cooke land noting the strong objections from area residents over the years to their plans for development.

Response: The AES team clarified that the land is owned by Kamehameha Schools and that people might be confusing it with Castle and Cooke's Koa Ridge project.

• A board member noted that another solar project in the area presented to the board.

Response:

The AES team clarified that was a HECO stage 1 project being developed by Clearway. This project is nearby on the same lands owned by Kamehameha Schools.

• A board member asked if this was agricultural lands, expressing concern regarding the impact to farming.

Response:

The AES team clarified that the land was in the urban state land use district and that there are no agricultural activities on this property . At a follow-up meeting on November 18, the board voted to adopt a resolution in support of the project. The vote was 13 ayes, 0 noes, and 1 abstention.

A copy of the adopted resolution has not yet been posted to the Neighborhood Board Commission website. However, the adoption of the resolution and associated vote is reflected in the minutes.

Mililani-Waipio Neighborhood Board No. 25

Due to several leadership changes and board vacancies that occurred from September to January, a presentation to the Mililani-Waipio Neighborhood Board has not yet been conducted. The project team is hopeful that a presentation can be made at the board's next scheduled March meeting.

Conclusion

AES is deeply committed to continuing outreach efforts to raise awareness about the project and address issues identified by the community. These efforts will continue through the entitlement and land use approval phase and beyond if the project receives the necessary permits and approvals.

RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF PROPOSED WAIAWA PHASE II SOLAR + STORAGE PROJECT

WHEREAS the state enacted the Hawaii Clean Energy Initiative (HCEI) and Renewable Portfolio Standard (RPS) with the goal of achieving 100 percent of energy production from renewable sources by 2045; and

WHEREAS, Hawaii routinely ranks as having the highest electricity rates in the United States; and

WHEREAS, numerous local efforts are being undertaken to reduce energy dependence and slow the threat of global warning; and

WHEREAS solar energy coupled with battery storage is recognized as a reliable source of locally produced clean renewable energy that reduces the need for imported fossil fuels while lowering carbon emissions; and

WHEREAS renewable energy projects will enable Hawaii to grow its green economy and provide green employment opportunities; and

WHEREAS, a new renewable energy project, Waiawa Phase II Solar + Storage, with 30 MW ac and 240 MW hours of battery storage is being proposed in Central Oahu: and

WHEREAS the Waiawa Phase II Solar + Storage project is anticipated to generate approximately 565 jobs and \$131 million in economic output: and

WHEREAS the Waiawa Phase II Solar + Storage project would provide enough energy to power the equivalent of 18,000 homes annually: and

WHEREAS the Waiawa Phase II Solar + Storage project would supply energy to the utility at a low fixed cost of \$0.12 kWh: now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Mililani Mauka/Launani Valley Neighborhood Board Number 35 recognizes the importance of contributing to the state's goal of producing 100 percent of Hawaii's energy from renewable sources by 2045, thereby reducing our reliance on imported fossil fuel and growing our green economy.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mililani Mauka/Launani Valley Neighborhood Board Number 35 supports the Waiawa Phase II Solar + Storage project to help achieve these energy and environmental goals; and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be transmitted to the Hawaii State Governor, Central Oahu area state legislators, State Land Use Commission, the State Office of Planning, the State Office of Energy, the Mayor of the City & County of Honolulu, Central Oahu City Council Members, the Director of the Department of Planning and Permitting and Central Oahu Neighborhood Board chairs.

<u>CALL TO ORDER</u>: Chair Dean Hazama called the meeting to order at 7:11 p.m.; **Quorum was established with seven** (7) members present. Note – This nine (9) member Board requires five (5) members to establish a quorum and to take official Board action.

<u>MEETING DECORUM</u>: Chair Hazama advised attendees to meet decorum at the Board meeting by raising hands to be acknowledged and to keep presentations to three (3) minutes.

BOARD BUSINESS

Waiawa Phase 2 Solar & Storage – (AES): Shane Peters and Kristin Punu presented the following.

- <u>AES Clean Energy Projects in Hawai'i</u>: AES is a provider of clean and affordable energy throughout Hawai'i with over 200 megawatts of projects across the islands.
- <u>Waiawa Site Location</u>: Approximately 387 acres, owned by Kamehameha Schools, located across from the Waipio Costco.
- <u>Project Components</u>: solar panels, battery containers and inverters, new substation, new power lines, new tie-in to existing Hawaiian Electric Company (HECO) power lines.
- Project Specifications:
 - o 30 megawatt (MW) alternating current / approximately 60 MW direct current solar photovoltaic
 - o 240 MW hours containerized lithium-ion battery energy storage (BESS).
 - Serves all of O'ahu by feeding into HECO's grid.
 - o 20-year Power Purchase Agreement (PPA) temporary use.
 - Requires commercial operation in 2023.
 - o Decommissioning restore land to existing condition (or comparable) at end of lifespan.
- <u>Benefits</u>: 565 local jobs created from project development and construction. Approximately \$131 million dollars in economic output. Locally-sourced power for approximately 18,000 O'ahu homes. Contributes to shutting down existing fossil fuel plants. Project will deliver power to HECO at a low-cost fixed-price of \$0.12/kWh over 20-years. Helps the state achieve its renewable energy goals.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed.

- 1. <u>Battery Containers</u>: Melendrez asked if the battery containers have AC. Peters responded that they have AC and a fire suppression system.
- 2. <u>Waiawa Projects</u>: Oishi asked if there will be three (3) solar farms in Waiawa after this one is completed. Peters responded that this one is by AES, Waiawa Phase 1 is by Clearway, and the third project is by a different developer.

- 3. <u>Previous Plans</u>: Rogers asked if Waipio Gentry terminated their development plans that they were working on for 15 years. Peters responded yes.
- 4. <u>Multiple Land-Use</u>: Rogers asked if this project is required to have multiple land-use purposes. Peters responded that the land they leased is in the State Urban Lands District and does not have a multiple land-use requirement.
- 5. <u>Office Location</u>: Melendrez asked where AES's office is located. Punu responded that the main headquarters is in Virginia, and the AES Clean Energy division's headquarters is in Colorado.
- 6. <u>Permitting</u>: Hazama asked that because this land is in the urban boundary, do you have to go back to the Land Use Commission (LUC) to ask for a special use permit. Peters responded that generally that is the case, but because the LUC has approved solar as an interim use on this land they just need the final approval by LUC.

Hazama MOVED and Rogers SECONDED the Motion to support the Waiawa Phase 2 Solar & Storage Project.

<u>Discussion</u>: <u>Cost of Energy</u>: Melendrez asked if the presented cost of \$0.12/kWh should be removed from the resolution because the board cannot verify that information. Hazama and Peters responded that it is a contractual agreement by the Public Utilities Commission of the State of Hawai'i and should be included in the resolution.

The Motion to support the Waiawa Phase 2 Solar & Storage Project PASSED by UNANIMOUS CONSENT 7-0-0 (Aye: Agader, Hazama, Hom, Melendrez, Oishi, Rogers, Tamashiro; Nay: None; Abstain: None).

- 4. <u>Trash Pick-Up</u>: Funakoshi complained that her trash was never picked up, asked what the process is for residents whose trash bin was left curbside but never picked up on the scheduled day. She went on to read a letter to the editor about public workers having a mandate to serve. Uchida responded that he will follow-up on the issue.

<u>Councilmember Brandon Elefante</u>: Councilmember Elefante highlighted his newsletter regarding the Honolulu Youth Commission, Pearlridge Rotary Club, Resolution 21-180 for Affordable Housing 201H-38 applications, Resolution 21-192 to Increase The Affordable Housing Fund, Resolution 21-199 Do Not Block Intersection Proposal, Expired Driver's

Licenses and State ID's, Resolution 21-224 requires a performance audit of the Department of Design and Construction (DDC), and provided a follow-up response to a question raised at the last meeting.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed. <u>Balanced Budget</u>: Funakoshi asked how the City is balancing their budget given that the State denied the City \$100 million dollars of funding. Councilmember Elefante responded that it will be tough to pass a balanced budget next year and one option to look at is exemptions.

<u>Governor David Ige's Representative</u>: Casey Abe (Department of Transportation State Highway Division) offered his sincere apology to Funakoshi and DPP Director Uchida regarding concerns of their request for a tree removal at the intersection of Moanalua Road and Ho'omalu Street. Initially Abe thought the tree was located on City and County land but after further investigation it is on State land.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed.

- 1. <u>Letter</u>: Veray noted that he is awaiting a response from the Outdoor Circle group and then he will send the letter.
- 2. <u>Electric Vehicles</u>: Inouye asked if electric vehicles, with only the driver inside, are still allowed in the HOV/Zipper lane. Abe responded that he will follow-up at the next meeting.
- 3. <u>Speed Bumps</u>: Liu asked what the process is to implement speed bumps in residential areas and nearby schools. Abe responded that it is City land and a Representative of the City can answer the question. Councilmember Elefante responded that these types of requests are common, and the procedure is for the Department of Transportation Services (DTS) to investigate to determine if it would warrant under the Manual of Uniform Traffic Code.

<u>Pearl City Library</u>: Vicky Bowie reported that all Public Libraries are currently closed on Wednesdays due to concerns about the pandemic, Governor Ige issued an executive order requiring visitors to show proof of vaccination or show a negative test result to enter State facilities, and there are concerning reports of the public mistreating library workers because of Ige's executive order.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed. <u>Gratitude</u>: Sosa expressed his gratitude towards Bowie and all the workers at the Pearl City Library.

Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam (JBPHH): Victor Flint reported that the U.S.S. Arizona Memorial Visitor Center dock needed repair after a steel collar broke and is now ready to resume operations, Red Hill fuel release point of origin was

a broken flange, the U.S. House of Representatives will fund continued Red Hill operations, after years of holding no meetings the Pearl Harbor Restoration Advisory Committee (PHRAC) will begin meeting again and any questions may be directed to Steve at 808-471-3865, and Loko Pa'aiau and oyster restoration was a success.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed.

- 1. <u>Representative</u>: Veray asked if Inouye will continue to communicate with PHRAC. Inouye responded yes and was just contacted by PHRAC.

 - Requires commercial operation in 2023.
 - Decommissioning restore land to existing condition (or comparable) at end of lifespan.

<u>Coalition for a Tobacco Free Hawai'i</u>: As the board adopted the resolution in support of this group earlier this meeting, the presenter did not take any additional time away from the meeting to present on the subject.

<u>Education on Potential Fraud Situations</u>: Alex Burtscher shared information, recent situations, and helpful tips to avoid being taken advantage of by scammers via email, phone, and mail. Questions, comments, and concerns followed: <u>Tour</u>: Doran expressed gratitude for the harbor boat tour. Doran inquired and Flint replied there is a marina, but civilians tend to stay on the other side of Ford Island and away from Pearl Harbor.

<u>Community Associations Update</u>: No report but will be participating in the events in Board Announcements. <u>Leeward Community College (LCC)</u>: Chancellor Carlos Penaloza shared LCC updates including increased enrollment, computer science professor elected to serve on the career and technical education advisory council, grants recipients, and the culinary program's Thanksgiving grab-to-go event.

<u>Honolulu Authority for Rapid Transportation (HART) Public Outreach Update</u>: Johnny Reid shared the weekly eBlasts regarding construction update video progress, Monday morning traffic update and overnight closures on Nimitz Highway, Aloha Hula and Crafts business spotlight, and announced upcoming board meetings.

PRESENTATIONS:

Storm Water Quality Division Update: The Department of Facility Maintenance (DFM) Director Roger Babcock provided an update regarding the storm water utility, a dedicated method of funding services needed to maintain Oahu's storm water system, streams, and near shore waters by creating funding certainty and improved programs to be preventative and proactive instead of reactive. Everyone will pay this utility based on the impervious area on a property, however there will be credits, rebates, and provisions available. A timeline of the process was provided with the first bills sent at the end of 2023, early 2024.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

- 1. <u>Budget</u>: Liu inquired and Babcock replied storm water maintenance is around \$100 million a year. Liu inquired and Babcock replied that the storm water would generate around \$100 million a year where they can be proactive. Liu inquired and Babcock replied that there would be provisions where the funds are used only for stream maintenance.
- 2. Fees: Doran raised concerns that implemented fees never goes away and it should be decided by the voters.
- 3. <u>Opposition</u>: Chair Veray noted the Board passed a resolution against the storm water utility.

4. <u>System Age</u>: Resident Sosa inquired and Babcock replied that the storm water utility system varies from new up to 100 years old.

Kalauao Bus Transit Center & Mobility Hub: DTS representative Soniat and G70 representative Wright provided an update for the Kalauao Bus Transit Center next to Pearl City rail station, between Best Buy and Homeward Furniture adjacent to the Pearl Harbor Historic Bike Trail. They are currently in the Special Management Area Permit – Major process with the goal to begin construction in 2024.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed: <u>Park and Ride</u>: Resident Sosa inquired and Wright replied that there is no park and ride because it is meant to connect the bus and tail. Soniat added that there is a kiss and ride for drop-offs.

Peters noted they are required to decommission the project in 20 years and return the land to its natural state but keep in mind the velocity at which technology changes, much of this was not possible five (5) years ago and in the future, new, better more efficient technology will probably be available. Peters also noted he cannot say what Kamehameha Schools will do with the parcel in the future.
- 2. <u>November</u>: Chair Chun noted the Board is not able to take action but will put it on the November agenda for consideration.

<u>Waipio Point Access Road Multimodal and Safety Improvements</u> – Chair Chun noted this is a carryover from the October 2021 meeting where they did a presentation and Shade Institute asked for a motion of support.

Andrade moved and Chang seconded the motion to approve the Waipio Point Access Road Multimodal and Safety Improvements. The motion passed unanimously 15-0-0 (Aye: Andrade, Chang, Chun, Cullen-Utu, Enriquez, Fajotina, Herolaga, Kealanahele, Koria, Lamasao, Macha, Oshiro, Rex, Yorong, Weyer; Nay: none; Abstain: none.)

9:04 p.m. Board member Andrade logged off. There are 14 members present

<u>Waiawa Phase 2 Solar and Storage</u> – Chair Chun noted this also a carryover from the October 2021 meeting and AES is also looking for support for the project. Board member Fajotina asked and Shane Peters noted the panels will be not be on agricultural but on urban lands.

Oshiro moved and Chang seconded the motion to support the Waiawa Phase 2 Solar and Storage Project. The motion passed by a vote of 13-0-1 (Aye: Chang, Chun, Cullen-Utu, Enriquez, Herolaga, Kealanahele, Koria, Lamasao, Macha, Oshiro, Rex, Yorong, Weyer; Nay: none; Abstain: Fajotina.)

9:15 p.m. Board member Weyer logged off. There are 13 members present.

PRESENTATIONS

<u>Coalition for a Tobacco Free Hawaii Youth Coalition – Proposed Resolution Urging State Action to Address the</u> <u>Youth E-Cigarette Epidemic.</u> Chanel Matsumoto shared a power point presentation entitled "Ending the Youth

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Vaping Epidemic" which noted Hawaii has one of the highest rate of youth vaping in the nation and the tobacco industry targets Hawaii when marketing menthol and "local" flavors. Matsumoto also noted it is very easy for kids to purchase e-cigarettes noting students in the 6th grade admitted to purchasing vaping products on line. For more information, go to <u>www.flavorshookkids.org</u>. Matsumoto read the resolution for consideration. Chair Chun asked if anyone would want to make a motion to support the resolution. None was heard. No action taken.

<u>Storm Water Utility Update</u> - Director Babcock noted the City needs to create and fund a Storm Water Utility which will be run by DFM and it is required by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). It would create dedicated special fund that can only be used for storm water. Director Babcock explained storm water, how it impacts the environment and noted it is better for the City to maintain the storm water system than to have to react to failed infrastructure due to heavy rain or storms. Director Babcock noted everyone needs to pay the same fee which will probably be approximately \$19.00 to \$23.00 monthly per household, based on the impervious area of your property no matter where you live and this is a new fee which will not be offset in any way and everyone will pay including Federal and State governments. Director Babcock noted there will be some hardship provisions and ways to apply for credits. For more information, go to their website: www.stormwaterutilityoahu.org. Chair Chun noted Director Babcock asked for a motion of support for the Utility, none was heard.

Questions, comments, concerns:

- 1. <u>Other Languages:</u> Board member Lamosao asked and Cami Closter noted they are looking into getting this information into different languages.
- 2. <u>Certification:</u> Board member Fajotina asked and Director Babcock noted that is one reason that this utility will take more than a year to certify each property because they will have to finish all the calculations of how much impervious surface is at each property. Director Babcock noted residential properties would have to be recertified every three (3) years.
- 3. <u>Tiers:</u> Board member Fajotina asked and Director Babcock noted all fees are based solely on the impervious area on a property and there is no tier system.
- 4. <u>New Department:</u> Board member Oshiro asked and Director Babcock noted they will be "piggy backing" with the BWS and Department of Environmental Services (ENV) for their data on size and who owns the property and who has or do not have sewer services and who would need to get a storm water bill who do not pay anything presently such as state and federal properties. Director Babcock noted it will take time to go through all the data and establish all the bills.
- 5. <u>What Prevents:</u> Board member Oshiro asked and Director Babcock noted there needs to be an ordinance to enable the utility to charge the City, the State and the Federal governments.
- 6. <u>Offset:</u> Board member Chang asked and Director Babcock noted there will be no offset in property taxes and this is a new and permanent fee.
