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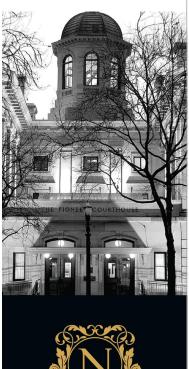

because in discussions with DPP, DPP recognized that that reference was actually technically incorrect.

A burial treatment plan is only prepared when iwi are discovered as part of an archaeological inventory survey previously identified burials.

None were identified during our archaeological inventory survey. Therefore, if any iwi were identified inadvertently during the operation of the quarry -- and let me be clear, no one anticipates that. There is no indication that that will occur. But if it did occur, those iwi would be addressed in a report that is known as a Burial Site Component of either a data recovery plan or a preservation plan, and that's under HAR 13-300-40(f). Those are the SHPD rules governing an inadvertent discovery of iwi during construction or other activities.

So that reference to the burial site or burial treatment plan was incorrect, and it simply was not carried forward because of that issue. In all other respects, the report and recommendations carried through to the Planning Commission are correct and carried through to this order are correct as well, including the provisions dealing with Chapter 60 and the protection of historic

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properties.

This -- the new owners -- sorry, I'm not going to say what island -- looked at the cost of the infrastructure loan recently, and they were -and I was blown away, to tell you the truth.

The infrastructure at the time of the change of the land use designation was approximately 6 million. Now it's 60 million, just on

infrastructure loan -- not vertical construction. 1 And that to me, just blew me away. And this was in 3 -- from 1980s to now. 4 So, currently, they are looking for 5 financing and developers because, you know, no one has 60 million in their wallet to say: "Here's 60 7 million, no problem. Let's do it now." I mean, it's -- it's just -- to me, it's 8 hard to imagine 60 million for any of us. So with 9 10 -- I have assisted in giving them some leads and government leads, for example, HHFDC that has some 11 12 infrastructure grants and loans. 13 Also, recently, OPSD received a grant from 14 the federal government that they're working on for 15 infrastructure. We're awaiting the RFP, or whatever comes out from them, but I'm going to give them --16 17 say, "Hey, contact OPSD, also, for this." 18 But, you know, I'm -- I'm holding until the RFP comes out. Then I'll send them the 19 20 information to OPSD -- or send them the information 21 from OPSD, and they can contact OPSD directly if, 22 you know, that RFP fits their needs. 23 Also, I've been in communication with the 24 owners and developers and attorneys on several projects that have started to get back on track.

This was by facilitating with owners and various organizations and state agencies such as DOT, HHFDC, HIEMA, et cetera, to address each concern starting building housing for the people of Hawaii.

For example, one project forgot to -- was trying to talk to HIEMA, which is, you know, making

trying to talk to HIEMA, which is, you know, making that signals, the sirens, and somehow that communication got broken and they were just waiting, so they couldn't start construction because they needed a plot of land to put that signal -- that siren.

So I got in touch with HIEMA, and they started to talk again. And for your information, HIEMA went to the site -- I'm going to say on a neighbor island -- and they finally got a piece of land for the siren. So that project is now back on track, and hopefully -- well, I shouldn't say "hopefully," but they are going to break ground soon. So that's the good part, ground break, et cetera.

Also, for your information, several projects needed permits to start construction, subdivision, et cetera, and in the near future -- they're in that process going through the -- the various councils and/or planning departments. So it

is in -- it is in that stage, which is good. 1 they're in that track. And so we'll see how it goes from there, but we'll -- I'm keeping my eyes out on 3 them. I'm contacting them every quarter. 4 5 So I just wanted to give you an estimation 6 that in -- I've touched at least -- or we, the Land 7 Use Commission, has touched approximately 19,000 units to date. And that's it, Chair. 8 9 CHAIR GIOVANNI: So -- so could you further clarify the last statement, 19,000 units? 10 11 What -- how -- how should we interpret what you say? 12 MR. WONG: So from -- let me put it this 13 Some of the dockets have been very vague in 14 sense of we are not -- you're going to build this 15 units. It doesn't say multi-family, single-family, affordable. It's just saying "units," period. So I 16 17 cannot tell you, like, they're going to build 10 18 affordable, 100 -- 100 multi-family, et cetera. I'm just using the word "units" just because units 19 20 could be multi-family and/or single-family because 21 older dockets are very vague in this sense. 22 The other thing too is some of them had a 23 statement to say we will build affordable up to the 24 City and County standards at that time -- or the 25 County -- sorry. Not City and County, but County.

So the affordable at that time could have
 1
   been 10 percent. Well, let's say the affordable
   units percentage now could be 20 percent. So, you
   know, it -- it's a very - - it changes the numbers.
 5
   So I cannot really say how much units are
   affordable, so that's why I'm just using 19,000 in

   general.

The original -- and -- and Commissioner

Lee, I think that what you're referring to is way

back when when we had represented that there was

45,000 to 65,000 units out there that had not been

built, we had a list of projects that -- that we had

no information on with regard to whether or not they

had actually begun construction. And that was where

the 45,000, 65,000 number came from.

That list has been given to Arnold, and he has been bulldozing his way through it to try and determine on whether or not these projects are viable. We are loathe to take projects that we know are dead, are -- and definitely not going to happen and revert them. We don't think that that is productive. But as long as there is someone that we can contact, we make efforts.

Arnold makes efforts to move projects along. It's an iterative process. There have been

CHAIR GIOVANNI: So thanks for that clarification. But if you evaluate a project and you come to the conclusion as you, in your own words, "it's dead," it's not going forward, how do you adjust the total number for -- to account for those units that were in dead projects?

MR. ORODENKER: Well, I mean, "dead" is a relative -- sometimes it's -- it's actually a -- a timing situation. Okay. And so what -- when I say "they're dead," is, I mean, right now, there's no way that these projects are going to move, so that's

think we spoke about it in the past, and I just wanted to bring it up again as a potential practice we could put into place -- and that is putting an item on the agenda title -- and entitled something like "Administrative Matters Updates," and then it can always be there. And if there is something to share, it can be shared, and if there's nothing, then there's nothing. But I think it might prompt us always being able to be updated about various things since we've been asking more and more for more transparency. So that would be my suggestion.

CHAIR GIOVANNI: Okay. I want to revert back to Mr. Wong's -- one of his opening statements, because it's a real pet peeve of mine personally, and it has to do with infrastructure costs on these projects, which have -- the indication on that one project that he was referring to, and I don't know which project it was, is that the -- the original estimate had exploded to a much bigger number, I

1 think, tenfold.

This is a story that I've heard over and over about why these affordable housing projects don't pencil out because you gotta put -- the developer has to do the infrastructure development first and they have to do it largely on their own account -- financial account.

I think it's -- I just want to make a general comment. I think it's a real problem for Hawaii to at this, on the one hand push so hard for affordable housing, as we all know we need it, and at the same time put the burden of the infrastructure cost on the developer, which translates to a per-unit cost which makes the housing, in some cases, unaffordable to begin with, and it therefore stalls the whole project.

So I think it's a much bigger problem than the LUC can solve. But burdening developers with infrastructure costs on any green site project, I think, is a real impediment to solving the affordable housing crisis in this State. I just want to put that on the record.

**COMMISSIONER U'U:** Question, Chair?

CHAIR GIOVANNI: Where -- who's raising --

COMMISSIONER U'U: Commissioner U'u.

CHAIR GIOVANNI: Commissioner U'u, please.

COMMISSIONER U'U: I just like to add what was said earlier by you, Chair. That is part of the problem definitely, the infrastructure cost has risen up. I think you're right where the burden has been put on the developers. But if other facets that we can help to bridge that gap of funds that's needed is the process -- is to expedite the process -- the process in -- in its entirety, you can minimize the cost.

I think the next one that, I think, was missing was sometimes the community is not ready for the project, so at times leaving it there, when the community feels it's time or it's needed now along with appropriate funding or infrastructure gets closer to make it affordable, I think it's key too. So there's many facets that goes into that.

I think there's a lot of it, but you're right, though, the -- the key is the gap -- bridge gap of infrastructure. But, again, sometimes it's the community. And, again we can shorten the process and that will take away some of that -- the entitlement process goes into that per-unit cost, also, whether it be the State, County,

We're not trying to move land back 11 into agriculture. We're trying to keep the 12 inventory of -- of urban lands available for 13 development as much as possible. I mean, so it's not that we're not bringing projects to you, it's 14 15 just that we're not trying to -- trying to revert 16 projects because it is our belief that with a little 17 help and some -- and -- and a change in timing, most 18 projects will eventually come to fruition. 19 I mean, theoretically, a lot of these projects haven't moved in 10 years. We have the 21 ability to revert them, but we're not actively 22 trying to do that. We would rather get -- give the 23 developers the time to work them out. So it's not 24 new projects, it's old projects that we're -- we're

And it has to do with a commentary not only among -- among those present, but among the -- the greater Hawaii community about whether or not development is sufficiently hindered because of all of the regulation and the costs that might be associated with regulation to -- to do project work in Hawaii.

And my concern is that in many regards, the LUC is -- these are my words -- a -- a safety net to assure that important matters -- and I'll -- I'll be explicit about what I think they are -- are accounted for in our decision-making and our deliberations.

You know, we are -- as we -- was shared with us by -- in our training sessions a month ago, there are numerous aspects that we have to take into account in any petition that comes before us. But four of them that jump out to me are -- and whether

you agree with them or not, they have to be accounted for, and one is the environmental review that goes with HRS 343 for projects which can be onerous and require a full-blown environmental impact statement -- is the public trust doctrine in which we've been educated on that we have to account for.

There are cultural assessments, sometimes referred to globally as the Ka Pa'akai analysis, that we have to take into account. And then we have to assure, for many projects these days, that there are available water resources to proceed.

So not giving these matters the attention that are required -- and when I say "required," they're either in my view -- again, I'm not an attorney -- but they seem to be mandated by either the Hawaii Constitution or -- and/or statutes that have been passed by the "leg" and signed by previous governors or the current governor.

What that means to me is that we -- we have to take those matters with diligence and seriously. And if we don't, and we make decision—making that is more expeditious, and we ignore the -- the details of what's required there, my view is we are running the risk of our decisions being

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appealed almost certainly, and there being incumbent
 1
   delays that go way beyond what was originally
 3
   intended.
             So I -- it's a tough call for us, but the
 4
   call that I think that -- that we have to make --
 5
   and this is just my opinion -- we gotta be cautious.
 7
   We gotta -- we gotta act prudently, and we gotta
   take these matters of 343, the public trust
   doctrine, Ka Pa'akai analysis, and availability of

   water, in due consideration on every project that

   comes before us. And if we don't, those -- these
   projects can be backfired because they're going to

I received it. I made a couple of changes because there were some typographical errors -- errors and things like that, but I did not make any real substantive changes, sent it back to them, and they told me that they wanted to bring it before their own commission before they send it back to us again.

A few weeks ago, they held a hearing on this which I attended and -- to make a long story short, their commission suggested some changes, and they authorized the Chair of the Commission on Water Resource Management to finalize an agreement with the Land Use Commission.

And that's kind of where we are. The Land Use Commission staff has not put any real substantive thought into this document. It is basically coming from Commission on Water Resource Management. We wanted to discuss it with the commission before we took it any further and see if the commission wanted to authorize the Chair to --

1 to continue with negotiations.

CHAIR GIOVANNI: So I want to back up a half a step at least. So my recall on -- at the end of the presentation by CWRM to the LUC commission in July was that, you know, we thanked them for their presentation, et cetera, and we said we'd like to find a way to be sure that when a petition comes before the LUC for which there are perceived or real water issues, that they were given an opportunity to proactively review and provide information to LUC as part of its deliberations and considerations.

I don't ever remember the word MOU being mentioned in that. It was more like, "Can we come up with a way that we could work together to make sure that we get your input when we need it?"

Right?

MR. ORODENKER: Actually, I went back and looked at the transcripts, and in several places Ms. Roth suggested an MOU.

CHAIR GIOVANNI: Ms. Roth suggested an MOU. Right. Correct. But we didn't request one, so they suggested it --

MR. ORODENKER: Right. Yes --

CHAIR GIOVANNI: -- maybe being the best

25 way forward. And maybe it is. I don't know.

So since then, I've not received any -- anything direct from staff or from anybody -- anyone with the CWRM or that commission. But I have -- I was aware that it was an agenda item, and I have seen a draft MOU.

My question is what's your best understanding, as it stands right now, on the process that may lead to an MOU or not -- on the process itself, where do we stand on it? What -- what's being proposed? What's -- how does it work?

MR. ORODENKER: Well, as soon as we got the latest draft of the MOU from the Commission on Water Resource Management staff, we -- we put it up on the website --

CHAIR GIOVANNI: Right.

MR. ORODENKER: -- for the commissioners to review. It's more -- it sets out the -- the -- the need for the Commission on Water Resource

Management and the LUC to exchange information on a more regular basis.

It sets forth the topics that the MO that the Commission on Water Resource Management would be commenting on, and it sets off -- sets forth the ways in which they may communicate with us, either by direct -- direct communication or by oral

communication or in writing and, also, as part of 1 the regular request for comments through the Office 3 of Planning and Sustainable Development. The -- the -- if you recall from the July 4 5 meeting, one of the issues that Commission on Water 6 Resource Management brought up is really what I 7 would call an internal issue, and that is OPSD sends the information over to the Department of Land and Natural Resources, the Department of Land and Natural Resources then sends it -- sends it to their 10 11 Land Use Division, the Land Use Division, under its own letterhead, sends the information on to 12 13 Commission on Water Resource Management staff, and 14 as a result, it may not even get any attention by 15 Commission on Water Resource Management. 16 And that -- that is the impetus for this 17 I -- I believe that the information that the 18 Commission on Water Resource Management can provide 19 us would be of assistance. I -- I -- I don't have 20 any much more of an opinion on it than that. 21 CHAIR GIOVANNI: And, well -- and you 22 raised another point of -- of interest to me -- not 23 concern, but interest -- is that the intent is not

looking for a way that OPSD, CWRM, and LUC could get

to bypass OPSD on this matter. It was really

MR. ARAKAWA: Okay. Thank you.

Anyway, I'm thinking that this whole process is "poho," meaning nothing's going to happen today. It's, you know, there's not going to be a vote, but notwithstanding that, there may be a vote. So I will testify.

Our -- my testimony is in opposition to the proposed MOU for various reasons. And the main reason -- one of the main reasons is there's no staff report verifying the reasons or justification for the MOU. And we are happy to hear Officer Orodenker say that it looks like it's due to an internal problem at DLNR or CWRM, one department or division is not talking to another division or department.

So there's nothing on the record, no facts on the record to justify the MOU or the failures to communicate within DLNR. There's no evidence of any CWRM failure to provide information or input to the LUC, and it is a very important -- water is a very important matter for your consideration, as you noted.

Land Use Research Foundation is composed of members, "kama'aina" and new members who are

We believe it's unnecessary -- the MOU is unnecessary because departments should be communicating with each other anyway, and the current EIS process -- you mentioned, Chapter 343 -- and the Land Use Commission District Boundary Review Process, HRS 205, provides ample opportunities for -- for that input.

We believe that this MOU is a attempt, another attempt at a power grab by Commission on Water Resource Management like the Governor's veto of House Bill 1088 in 2023 where it tried to get more authority over water emergencies and water shortages, and that was vetoed by the Governor, and this commission also rejected in 2023 a couple of proposed rule changes which would have required CWRM's authorization or approval before the commission could take action on a -- on a matter.

And that is simply -- certain things are within -- Mr. Chair, certain things are within CWRM's "kuleana," and it's great when they comment on it, but certain things are not within their

"kuleana"; it's the LUC's "kuleana." Right?

And so we believe that -- that under the current process, that the LUC can get the best information possible from the CWRM. There's no need for a MOU to spell out specific things.

We have specific comments on the terms of the MOU, but perhaps that could wait until if -- if this thing moves forward. But I think the -- either the DLNR Director, CWRM Chair, or -- or one of the commissioners noted that the more detailed those "topics" are, those are invitations for lawsuits.

And so if you already have laws that encourage and sometimes require input from CWRM, best to use the existing laws to get that expertise before the commission, this commission, rather than create a whole new document that creates new obligations that could end up in court someday and could further -- you mentioned this, Mr. Chair -- it could further delay needed projects, and it could cause litigation.

So that's our two cents. We have a lot of other comments on the specifics of this, but we believe that the MOU would expand impermissibly, and perhaps unconstitutionally, expand the powers and duties of CWRM in relation to the -- the LUC.

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And we are troubled that OPSD and what --
 1
   what we heard earlier, OPSD and the Board of Water
 3
   Supply, and the LUC stakeholders, the petitioners,
   have not been consulted with respect to this
 5
   proposed MOU.

             So there are a number of other items.

24	thanks for coming forward again. So please proceed.
25	MS. ROTH: Thank you. Yeah, I wasn't

planning to provide testimony, but here to answer questions that you may have. I've been listening to the conversation, and I did want to make some clarifying points.

Regarding the last statement about whether or not our commissioners had reviewed the MOU prior to that August 20th Water Commission meeting, they had not. That's pretty normal and standard for how we operate meetings. We don't, you know, provide briefings in most cases prior to agendized items coming before our Water Commission.

We've done MOUs with other agencies, as you mentioned, the PUC, so this was not thought to be something that would be out of the norm. We definitely did receive more comments and some concerns more so than what we anticipated, and we did our best to try to alleviate those questions and concerns which, again, is why the commission ultimately voted to move forward with the MOU pending discussion from this commission.

Some of the other things that I want to mention, you know, there's been a lot of discussion about the purpose and intent of this MOU. We've talked about how there's internal processes within -- excuse me, within the Department of Land and

Natural Resources that could be improved upon, which definitely is a component of this MOU. But I would say that it's not the only component.

There's other ways that we could better collaborate and communicate and be a bit more proactive in information-sharing outside of official doc reviews for items that come before your commission. That included -- and it's detailed in the MOU where we, you know, designate new areas as ground or surface water management, issues related to drought, you know, climate change where we're seeing fluctuations, and water availability, particularly declines in water resources which may be of importance to this commission as you vote on whether or not to approve new developments.

Sustainable yield updates. That's something that we're in the process of considering whether or not to update -- well, we're going to be updating our sustainable yields for aquifer for statewide, but we're having an internal conversation right now on how we will go about doing that. We have new data from the USGS, new recharge numbers and data based on climate change predictions and models.

So things like that that, you know, are



not officially part of a formal review process as 1 doc reviews go, but are things that we feel are 3 important for us to communicate on to be more proactive in our engagement given the nexus between 5 Land Use Planning and Water Resource Management. 6 Maybe I'll also just mentioned that, you 7 know, this MOU is not intended to be legally binding in any way. It states that clearly in the text as well as, you know, it's not meant to be inconsistent 10 with any existing applicable laws, policies, administrative rules. 11 I know the gentleman from LURF had some 12 13 specific concerns about the legality and repercussions of this MOU. I would maybe just ask 14 15 that you, you know, consult with your deputy 16 attorneys on the correctness of those statements 17 which, again, I just would probably prefer to have a 18 conversation about whether or not those are actually 19 true. 20 Thank you. That's all. I'm happy to 21 answer any more questions. 22 CHAIR GIOVANNI: Thank you very much, Ms. 23 Roth. 24 So questions? Commissioner -- is that

you, Myles? Please proceed, Commissioner Miyasato.

I think it would behoove both of us to have 1 conversations ahead of those meetings and have, you 3 know, a conversation about comments we may have prior to sitting in in a meeting and offer official 5 testimony. It's kind of a little, potentially too 6 late at that point, and I think we want to make sure 7 that we both have an understanding about the implications of approvals on both ends prior to 8 actually sitting in on an agendized meeting. 10 COMMISSIONER MIYASATO: So you would want a meeting with the commissioners privately? 11 12 MS. ROTH: Not privately, no. This would be, again, as part of -- in the example of a 13 document review that come before us that are 14 15 officially routed through OPSD, through our Department of Land and Natural Resources. You know, 16 17 we're just basically asking that in addition to that 18 formal process of document routing, we could be 19 notified via email or a phone call to say, "Hey, 20 please look out for this document. We think it's 21 important for these reasons. We really want to get your feedback and comment on it." 22 23 That's not currently happening, and in 24 some cases we may not be -- even be receiving the 25 documents to review. So we just want to make sure

that we are in communication, and, yes, direct

   talking to the LUC staff about a docket?

             MS. ROTH: Yeah, that's a great question.

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COMMISSIONER CARR SMITH: Thank you. 1 2 **COMMISSIONER YAMANE: Mr. Chair?** 3 CHAIR GIOVANNI: Commissioner Yamane. COMMISSIONER YAMANE: Hi. 4 Thank you, Ms. 5 Roth. 6 A question. So it sounds like this MOU --7 you're talking about adding better communications is within staff, like staff to staff. How does the commissioners know about those communications except 10 to ask you -- to call you in front of a meeting and 11 agendize that? Within the framework of this MOU, 12 how does that handle that? 13 MS. ROTH: Sure. Well, any comments we provide which, again, would be in writing, would be 15 provided as part of, I think, the -- the submittal 16 or agendized action item that staff presents. I --17 maybe I would defer to Dan to comment a little bit 18 more about how this would work internally in terms 19 of communicating our comments to commissioners 20 themselves. 21 **COMMISSIONER YAMANE:** Where is Dan? 22 CHAIR GIOVANNI: Dan Orodenker. We lost 23 him. 24 So, Ms. Roth, just let me follow up on 25 that question that Commissioner Yamane put forth and go backwards a little bit into the prior questions.

So what we're really trying to do is to make sure that we have the benefit of your input on petitions that come before the Land Use Commission for which there are relevant water issues. The worst case scenario is we don't hear from you at all, and that's what has occurred in the recent past on some cases.

So we're trying -- so my invitation to -to -- to you and to OPSD was, especially in this
time where water issues are more critical than ever,
in my memory, on a petition-by-petition basis. This
commission wants to hear from you.

So, for example, and this is purely hypothetical, if we have a petition before us for a -- a new development and we hear testimony from a consultant of the petitioner that they're, "Oh, there's -- the sustainable yield is more than -- more than enough and there is no water issues here."

If that's the only information we have, it -- I -- I don't feel comfortable making a decision without OPSD and CWRM weighing in to either confirm that or to disagree with that, or to clarify up on top of that.

And if we're not hearing from you because



there are communication problems, then the purpose of my invitation was let's solve those communication problems so that we hear from you when we need to hear from you. 4 Does that make sense to you? 5 6 MS. ROTH: Absolutely, yes. And that 7 definitely is a component of what this MOU is 8 intending to do. CHAIR GIOVANNI: Okay. Thank you. 9 10 Commissioner Carr Smith. 11 COMMISSIONER CARR SMITH: So isn't the 12 process already in place for OPSD to notify DLNR 13 through the Lands Division to you? You get that. 14 Right? And so it -- isn't it your "kuleana" to 15 respond and, if appropriate, bring matters to our 16 attention, or be at our meeting to testify, or --17 MS. ROTH: Yes, absolutely. I think the 18 issue has been that we're not always getting those 19 memos from our Land Division. 20 COMMISSIONER CARR SMITH: So isn't that 21 something you need to work out with the Land 22 Division? 23 MS. ROTH: Yeah, it definitely is. 24 definitely is something that we're working on 25 internally as well. And, again, this MOU is just

1	intended to try to add an additional layer of
2	assurance that we are understanding and aware of
3	issues before the LUC.
4	CHAIR GIOVANNI: So the Chair would like
5	to turn attention to OPSD that is present. This is
6	a three-party discussion.
7	So, Ms. Kato and Ms. Katia, do you have
8	comments on this matter as far as two things: One,
9	the existing process and and deficiencies within
10	it, if any, or if somebody or are we just
11	dropping the ball? And, secondly, any comment on
12	whether you think an MOU such as this would help
13	address those issues that that do exist?
14	MS. KATO: Alison Kato. Katia Balassiano
15	would like to say a word on this. Thank you.
16	CHAIR GIOVANNI: You're still under oath
17	<del></del>
18	MS. BALASSIANO: Katia Balassiano,
19	Planning Program Manager at OPSD.
20	In regards to the processes, I believe
21	Commissioner Carr Smith characterized our current
22	processes correctly.
23	We receive materials that are going to be
24	put on an agenda from the LUC staff. We forward
25	materials to the agencies that are called out in the

petition or who may have an interest in the matter. We draw attention to the relevant topics or, let's say, conditions within the docket to the various agencies.

We might ask a specific question or two depending on the matter or our understanding of the matter so that we have a little back-and-forth conversation with the agencies, and then we ask for their comments in writing. We provide a timeline for the responses. If we don't get a response within that time frame, we usually try a second time, and sometimes a third time to get a response, and then we report to the LUC what we have heard and whether we've heard anything.

And our understanding is that, you know, for certain agencies, it travels through sometimes the circuitous route to get to the various entities that we wish to hear from; but we, you know, respect the internal processes that agencies use to generate comments.

We believe that those internal routing processes are intended to keep managers aware of policy decisions and staff workloads. We -- we understand that it's for record-keeping and consistency of requests and responses. It -- it

helps managers assess staff performance and knowledge, and it confirms that responses are correct and complete when -- when, you know, it -- it passes through this process, and perhaps different people have to review something before it gets formally to the OPSD.

And -- and then as we collect information from the various agencies, because we're the ones who represent the State's position, sometimes we need to work with the agencies to reconcile different perspectives. But we -- we do that. And everything that we find, we send along to the LUC as part of our testimony. So that -- that is the process that's used.

And whether this MOU would help, we've -we've not been party to the conversations pertaining
to this MOU. So I -- you know, perhaps those
conversations can go on. But we're -- we're under
the impression that, you know, there are no -- as -as Ms. Roth says, there are no new statutory
obligations associated with this MOU.

I guess we'd be concerned that if, you know, CWRM shares preliminary information with LUC staff and then it's later revised when it comes up through standard DLNR channels to OPSD, that, you

know, there -- there may be conflicting information
out there and we'd, you know, be a little concerned
about that.

But we -- we trust that CWRM, DLNR, LUC staff would, you know, bring us into those conversations in a timely manner so that we can, you know, be party to it and -- and -- and, you know, do our job before the LUC in representing the State's interests.

CHAIR GIOVANNI: So you -- thank you. So you described -- the first part of your response was the process, and you spoke to that in generic terms of how it works for all agencies.

But our issue here today is that we're -this particular group, CWRM is on record that
they're not getting -- that process is broken in
some cases. It's going to some intermediary desk or
agency -- Land Division, I think I heard, and it may
or may not reach CWRM, and so they're not even given
the opportunity to weigh in.

So can you comment on what assurances -because what -- what we were asking for at the end
of the presentation that CWRM presented to us is -is the three parties -- LUC, OPSD, and CWRM -working together to make sure that matters of

interest, specifically water issues on a particular 1 petition, that the -- that CWRM was fully aware and 3 given the opportunity to weigh in through the process back through OPSD through us. And it wasn't 5 working. 6 So what -- what is the process 7 specifically for how you get information to CWRM? Where does it go? Because you're not going to them directly. We're hearing that. 10 MS. BALASSIANO: Because DLNR has many different divisions, and so we have been instructed 11 12 by the -- by DLNR's Chair to send things to DLNR. 13 And then as Ms. Roth suggested, it goes to the Land Division, and then it goes to another, you know, 14 15 six, seven different entities for their comments. 16 So, you know, unless DLNR tells OPSD that 17 they would like to have, you know, the 18 correspondence sent to them directly, we are abiding 19 by what we've, you know, heard from -- from DLNR --20 CHAIR GIOVANNI: So if -- so now let's tie 21 it to a hypothetical MOU. So if an MOU, 22 hypothetically, was agreed to between the Chair of 23 the Board of Land and Natural Resources and the Chair of the LUC that such -- such inquiries would 24 25 be sent by you directly to CWRM if they pertain to

certain -- certain matters and not through the Legacy network at DLNR, that is something you could 3 do. But you don't have that guidance presently. Is that correct? 5 MS. BALASSIANO: Yeah. I -- I -- we're 6 not sure that an MOU is necessary for that. We have 7 regularly been told by the various agencies if there is a point person who should be receiving our requests -- and, occasionally, that point person 10 changes as, you know, staff changes. However, we would be happy to, you know, work something out with 11 -- with the Chair to, you know, see if there is a 12 13 different routing system that could be used. I'm --I'm not sure that we would need an MOU to confirm 14 15 that with every single agency. 16 CHAIR GIOVANNI: Yeah. I tend to agree 17 with that as well. 18 Commissioners, anything further for either 19 CWRM or OPSD? 20 COMMISSIONER LEE: Chair --21 CHAIR GIOVANNI: Commissioner Carr Smith? 22 Let me go Carr Smith and then I'll go 23 Commissioner Lee. 24 COMMISSIONER CARR SMITH: I'm sorry. 25 I was just wondering is there any reason



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why we can't lengthen the time frame available for

   these agencies to respond?

             CHAIR GIOVANNI: It depends on the -- on
   the -- the timing for petitions.

                                                That's --
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that's helpful. I mean, that seems like a fair amount of time, so I was just trying to ascertain whether timing is a big issue or it's more of a routing process or it's more that maybe certain agencies are too busy to respond, so they don't respond. I don't think -- it sounds to me like OPSD does what their process requires them to do. And if people don't respond, that's their problem, not really OPSD's or LUC's, in my opinion.

MR. ORODENKER: I -- I don't disagree with that.

CHAIR GIOVANNI: So that means you agree with that. If you "don't disagree" means you agree?

Got it.

MR. ORODENKER: There are -- I mean, we went through this with -- what do you call it? -- Historic Preservation a while back over at DLNR as well.

There are times when the internal processes of the various agencies just wind their way too slowly, and we don't get information. I think you have to go back and look at why this whole thing evolved. And that was because there was some criticism in a couple of periodicals about the fact that the Land Use Commission didn't seem to be able

to understand and have all the information in front of it with regard to water, which is why we asked CWRM to make the presentation.

And as the Chair stated earlier, water is very important as part of our public trust doctrine obligations. And that was why we had CWRM come and talk to us to explain to the commissioners how their processes worked.

There are a number of ways to go about getting -- improving the situation, and an MOU is just one way to do it. I think that it's up to this commission on how they want to move forward with regard to this particular issue.

CHAIR GIOVANNI: So, Mr. Orodenker, I have a question.

So if you -- if you -- if staff receives a petition, do you just -- do you send that petition, without specific reference, to OPSD for comment, and they decide what's -- what aspects to look into in more detail with their own processes, or does our staff, our LUC staff, look at that petition and say, "Oh, this one might have some -- some particular water issues that" and would you highlight that to LUC -- to the OPSD staff so that they could know up front that the LUC staff wants them to weigh in

specifically on that matter? 1 2 MR. ORODENKER: The answer to that is yes 3 and yes. I mean, we do send it directly, you know, as a matter of course to OPSD without any comment on 5 it. However, as time approaches -- I mean, remember 6 a lot of times, these petitions are -- since we're 7 -- we -- we do contested case hearings are preliminary filings. And as the time approaches for the hearing and as we get more information from the 10 petitioners and from the County and from OPSD, 11 different issues arise, and so then we start asking for OPSD for information with regard to certain 12 13 things. Sometimes we don't even see it until the 14 15 hearing itself, but we make an effort to try and get 16 whatever information we can and make -- make OPSD 17 aware of what topics are going to be of concern for 18 the commission. 19 **CHAIR GIOVANNI:** Okay. 20 Is that --21 COMMISSIONER LEE: Commissioner Lee. 22 CHAIR GIOVANNI: Yeah. I was going there. 23 I want to make sure Commissioner Carr Smith was 24 good.

(Nods head.)

COMMISSIONER CARR SMITH:

25

CHAIR GIOVANNI: Yeah.

And before I go to you, Commissioner Lee, do you have your hand up, Ms. Roth?

MS. ROTH: Thank you.

Yes, I just wanted to quickly add, you know, in terms of the doc review routing process, I just wanted to clarify that CWRM, we're actually administratively attached to DLNR, so we're not an official division which may play into some of the routing issues we've experienced.

I'll also add that, you know, to your point, Chair Giovanni, when we do receive those requests for comments, as far as I know, it is not explicit, like in bold, highlighted letters, "This is of particular interest to CWRM. We need to know X, Y, and Z about water."

That is not part of what's provided to us, so it's really up to staff to review those documents, you know, take a hard look, which we, you know, obviously want to and should be doing. But I just want to caveat that with the fact that we, obviously, are a very underfunded and understaffed agency and responsible for a tremendous amount of work regarding water resource management.

So it is important for us to kind of be



flagged with, "Hey, pay attention to this one in 1 particular," which, again, is part of the intent of this MOU for LUC staff to be able to flag that for us or OPSD, whoever, you know, it makes more sense to be the communicator of that information. 5 6 CHAIR GIOVANNI: Yeah. Thank you, Ms. 7 Roth. Let me also add that in addition to 8 particular issues to be flagged, I'm also interested 10 in what you offered up in terms of new information that might be forthcoming from your -- from your 11 work of your commission. That would be a relevant, 12 13 generic interest to LUC as it proceeds with its 14 work. So, also, interested in hearing from you on a 15 more regular basis on that. 16 So, Commissioner Lee, your turn. 17 COMMISSIONER LEE: Thank you, Chair. You know, I also didn't recall that the --18 19 there was any kind of a tacit invitation for an MOU 20 at this. And so it sounds to me like this is quite 21 a stretch. In fact, if there's an MOU, it should be 22 between CWRM and Land Division, not between LUC. 23 I mean, the -- this whole process where it

goes to OPSD first and then it goes down, I mean,

that was -- that was established by legislative and

24

25

administrative rule procedures, you know, and we're 1 -- an MOU circumvents that -- the -- the authority, 3 the deliberation, the chain of custody and command. You know, I think it's a risk to do an MOU 4 5 because even though at the CWRM meeting, they said, 6 "Oh, well, it doesn't change anything, it's nothing 7 we, you know, we -- we can't do anyway." I mean, just pick up the phone. It sounds 8 9 like someone's not doing their job if these 10 important decisions aren't being properly routed or 11 being communicated. And if we have an MOU, that adds additional liability, I feel, to this thing. 12 13 This just -- there's already processes in place. An MOU can make us run afoul of this 14 15 established authority and -- and -- and procedures. 16 And it brings up many of the same concerns that I 17 remember from Cal Chipchase's testimony on the proposed administrative rules from last year. 18 19 So as I'd referenced that, I -- I asked 20 myself, "Whatever happened to those administrative 21 rules when they were proposed?" And I -- I recall 22 you, as Chair, asking the executive officer to 23 contact the various county planning departments for 24 comments and input on how the process can be

improved.

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Has that ever been done? I don't think

        So why aren't we working on things like that to

   improve the process instead of an MOU (audio

24	That's one I think it's lacking here.

to enter an MOU and delegate to the Chairperson to finalize the MOU and make non-substantial edits appropriate, I -- I couldn't support that. And the reason is I believe the body has the power, not just the Chair. I think we run on nine people, and everyone's different. To authorize any one person for that one matter could be conflicting to what the board feels as a whole.

And to add to that, I've not voted -- I
never had an opportunity to vote for the Chair. Not
saying I wouldn't vote for you, Dan, but it was
never given to me. That opportunity was never
given. And -- and that's what's different with this
commission than other commissions.

On other commissions, what I notice, to have movements, say, like an MOU or any type of change, it has to be done internally where the body would come up with a TIG, and the TIG would come up with an MOU to -- not only an MOU. The -- the -- the body will come up with the movement necessary to see change needed within our body, not staff creating rules or creating MOUs, talking to other staff to create more rules and MOU. And -- and the -- and the commission, the body, responds to what the staff did, that is new to me too.

What's missing also in this MOU is not just the body of the commission. It is the County that's missing too; and, again, the -- the plaintiffs who applied for this process. In order to get by it from myself and others, I think we need way more transparency than what is seen here, from me anyway.

When I found out that this was on CWRM, and I watched a little bit, guys, I love my life. I -- I try to just do my job, and that's it. I heard Dan say, "Oh, the staff creates the LUC." That's what I heard from Dan -- Dan O. And I don't know what staff. It could have been CWRM, it could have been LUC, but I think it should have been brought up to us.

We should have had the ability to steer or navigate the process before CWRM. This is how I feel. I feel -- was left out in the dark. And, again, maybe again and again, I start pointing fingers.

When I hear the terms "additional layers," when I hear the terms "lack of a better word" to explain something, and for me to vote on a process that is still unclear, I have to vote no in its entirety, because I believe from the start, it --

it hasn't had the transparency and the belief for me to believe in something that might help.

We already talked about -- and I agree with what you said, Chair Giovanni. We gotta respect all the issues, the EA and the EIS, 100 percent -- 100 percent. But we ought to respect for the plaintiffs and the County and the commission to require something to do this might potentially add an additional layer.

We already know we have layers upon layers. Land Use Commission, just to let you guys know -- not Land Use Commission -- Land Use laws in the state of Hawaii is ranked last place. We are third more than any other place. So when I hear we are creating you to get streamlined, I've never seen one worked out in a favor of streamlining. Ever.

In my 20 years in dealing with government, not once. So this is old news; it sounds like bad news; it's not transparent. I'm running out of time. If I had the opportunity, I would vote no.

Just letting you guys -- but if you want me to create one, we'll create a TIG and take it through the process because the end to solving -- solving certain things that need to be solved. But I also understand we need staff like Dan with the

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experience to help us create that and who is left

to resolve it, whether it be through an MOU or raising the issue explicitly.

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Let me also counsel OPSD, who will be coming to make presentations before the LUC of its own on -- on the inner workings of its staff and its -- and its department in support of Land Use matters.

Let me very strongly encourage OPSD to tell this commission, when it comes before us, how this issue has been addressed. The issue I'm speaking of is there are a -- a -- hypothetically, a petition of -- will be coming on land use before this Land Use Commission, and there are water issues that are flagged, and I'm -- I'm looking at our own staff to flag those issues.

But I want to make sure if we flag a water issue by our staff, it doesn't get lost in the bureaucracy of the State someplace. It get -- it makes its way to CWRM, and we give an adequate amount of time so we can have the benefit of their feedback and input prior to any decision- making and consideration by LUC. That's the problem we want to solve.

I don't think an MOU will necessarily 25 solve it. I will be supporting the motion.
